COMBATting A CRISIS: INFANT MORTALITY RATES

Infant mortality is the #1 indicator of public health in a community.² Use of **only human milk** to feed preemies and low birthweight infants **reduces mortality by 75%.**³ As of 2022,⁴ fragile babies continue to fall behind in key service areas:

“Kayden was in the NICU, where he was on a feeding tube, cpap machine, along with an IV port through his belly button. We went from the feeding tube, to syringe, to a slow feeder bottle. We used donor milk until I was able to produce for my son. Today, he’s doing very well! I am very thankful for the donor milk that was the first thing that was fed to my son.”

Creates family friendly work environments by empowering both employees and employers.

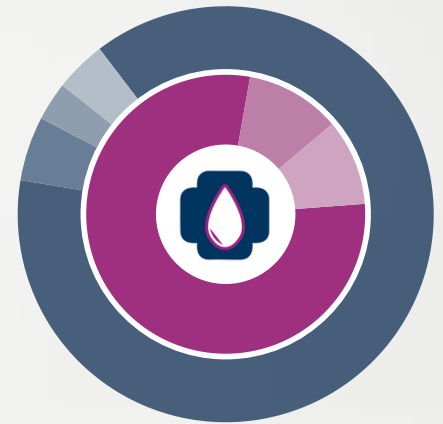
